### Getting ready: Taking the preconference masterclasses

They will learn with implementation experts about key concepts, tools and skills relevant to policy implementation, implementation research and practice.

#### **Conference overview**

The conference has a series of **four 'State of the Field' plenary sessions** bringing together panels of insightful speakers to discuss the latest insights and challenges policy implementation, data and measurement, the practice of implementation and implementation research.

Over the two days, a choice of **36 interactive workshops** will highlight specific learning relevant to implementation practice, policy implementation and implementation research. Speaking from analysis and first-hand experience, the sessions will focus on:

- Creating and sustaining readiness of organisations and people to address change through implementation
- Assessing fit and feasibility of innovations
- Supporting leaders and decision makers to guide successful implementation
- Using data to guide analysis and decision-making in implementation and improvement
- Scaling, scaling up and going to scale
- Multi-tiered approaches to practice, organisational and system change

Alongside this there will be also be examples of the rich mix of the depth and breadth of implementation practice and science shared through **more than 100 interactive storyboards** where delegates will be able to network with those who are engaged in implementation research and practice across the globe.
